Gwion Huw as her ten year old brother Saul was a typical young boy. Again, this actor played the role beautifully. He tackled the role head-on, going straight for the emotional center as he drew you into his world. From time to time he gave the impression of hope as we came to terms with what history has to teach us.

The second half saw the combined schools of RCT tell the same story through music and verse. As so often on stage, the children came alive and not one faltered. They were magnificent and took to the stage with great ability. Full marks go to the adults who trained them. This was a wonderful performance by adults and children alike in a combination which worked well.
